Raising awareness of the SDGs in the tourism sector

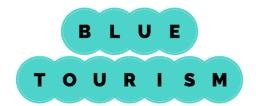

Good practices: global sustainability in Herdade of Cortesia, Portugal

Herdade of Cortesia Hotel is a 4-star hotel located on the bank of Maranhão reservoir, in Avis, Alentejo. The hotel results from a modern architectural project, perfectly integrated within the landscape.

It offers 30 rooms, the 180 Restaurant with a fantastic view over the reservoir and the Avis village, a swimming pool, and several activities such as donkey tours, bike tours, horse tours, boat tours and more. The hotel is also the training centre for high level competition rowing and canoeing teams, receiving the best national teams.

The Herdade da Cortesia, which is also a member of ANP/WWF, has been developing activities where environmental preservation is the central key. The hotel is also a member of the Nautical Portugal that contributes to a diversification of the tourist offer and has the potential to reduce seasonality and in addition to adding value to nautical resources.
